## FIRST AID EQUIPMENT AND FACILITIES

<b>First Aid Kit</b>	Managers/ Coaches should be in possession of a first aid kit. A general kit is available in the equipment cupboard at the car park end of the sports and social club building.
<b>First Aid Room</b>	The sports and social club can be used if open as can the cricket club house.

## EMERGENCY ACCESS ROUTES

All emergency vehicles will access the site via the gated entrance from Bridge Street. The vehicle should progress along the access road into the first car park where they will be directed to the area of the site where their attendance is required. The pitch plan at the bottom of this document can be used to direct the emergency services.

## You Should Call 999 or 112 for cases such as:

- Chest Pain
- Difficulty in breathing
- Loss of consciousness
- Severe blood loss
- Severe burns and scalds
- Choking
- Fitting/convulsions
- Drowning
- Severe allergic reactions

## What to Expect When You Dial 999 or 112

When you ask for the ambulance service, our call handlers will ask you a number of questions. Every Call that we receive is 'triaged'. This is where we decide what the most appropriate response to your call is. Not all calls require an ambulance to be sent – initially you will be asked four questions –

1. Is the patient breathing?
2. What address are you calling from?
3. What number are you calling from (in case you get cut off and we need to call you back)
4. What is the reason for the call

We need as much information as possible from you about the patient's condition as this will help us assess what response to make. Answering these questions will not delay us, but will help us give you important first aid advice while our staff are on the way. The extra information also helps us to make sure you get the most appropriate help. Not all calls require an ambulance to be sent – sometimes a paramedic in a rapid response car will be dispatched. On other occasions, you will be passed to an experienced paramedic who will discuss what to do next – For example they may refer you to your GP or walk in centre or simply give advice.
